Use the following for end punctuation:

- The period (known as a full stop in British English) is probably the simplest of the punctuation marks to use. You use it like a knife to cut the sentences to the required length. (For example: Rome is the capital of Italy.)
- The exclamation mark is used to express exasperation, astonishment, or surprise, or to emphasise a comment or short, sharp phrase. In everyday writing, exclamation marks are used sparingly if at all. (For example: That's unbelievable!)
- Use the question mark at the end of all direct questions. (For example: What is your name?)
